“Lockjaw” No More — Zena’s Story

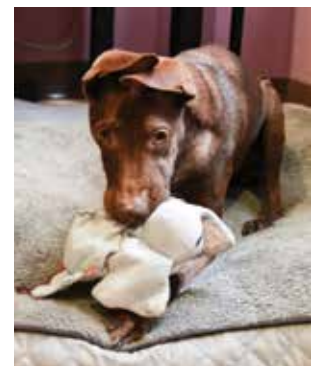


As with many of the injured pets that come into our shelter, we could only speculate how 18-month-old Zena came to us in the state that she was in. Initial evaluations and X-rays showed that Zena had previously suffered from serious physical trauma to her face, and with those

injuries left untreated, her jaw bone healed incorrectly and left her unable to open her mouth — a disfigurement she was forced to suffer through for over a year. Eating and drinking was a chore for Zena that she carried out through

the side of her mouth. Her barks were muffled, playtime was limited to frustratingly nudging toys around with her muzzle, and doggie kisses were an unknown concept to her.

However, thanks to contributions from generous donors like you, Zena was recently able to undergo orthopedic surgery using donations from our Michaels Medical Rescue Fund. With daily jaw rehabilitation and encouragement from our staff, we were recently fortunate enough to get a first glimpse of Zena’s pearly whites, and we are looking forward to many more firsts on her successful road to recovery.

Have a Heart for Heartworm-Positive Dogs



Lucas (formally known as Inigo-Montoya) found himself at the San Antonio Humane Society (SAHS) on more than one occasion: first as a surrendered pet and then as a stray. On his second return to the shelter, it was discovered that Lucas was afflicted with heartworm disease, and we were heartbroken.

Not because his affliction was terminal, but because adopters are more inclined to overlook heartworm-

positive dogs in favor of other healthy dogs, thus extending their length of stay at the shelter. This is in spite of the treatability of the disease.

In fact, generous adopters who bring home a heartworm-positive dog from SAHS are able to continue their adopted dog's heartworm treatment at local VCA Animal Hospitals, free of charge, saving potentially hundreds to thousands of dollars.

Although Lucas suffered from heartworm disease, his

personality was that of a buoyant and friendly young Collie mix happy to go on his daily walks. "He was just so amazed by everything," says Karenn about the first time she spotted Lucas. "He was so happy, even though he was there, and I knew I had to take him."

Although Karenn had some initial concerns about adopting Lucas, she says her experience getting him heartworm-free was easy, "When I took him [to a VCA Animal Hospital], they treated him so nice and I felt so comfortable taking him there. The process was fast and . . . they answered all my questions. I had to leave him over night and they were very good in informing me how he was doing."

Karenn adopted Lucas in August of last year, and she says he's changed her life for the better, "I have so many fun stories about Lucas! He has definitely changed my life." Nowadays, Lucas spends his time being chased and cuddled by his Yorkie pet sibling.

Karenn hopes potential adopters will look past a dog's heartworm-positive diagnosis to see the needy and deserving pet underneath, "These are probably the animals that need the most love," she added.

Thanks to donors like you, Lucas, and other heartworm-positive dogs like him, are able to get that love and the heartworm treatment they need while they await adoption.
