

Seconds to Death to Second Chance at Life



When Petunia first came to the San Antonio Humane Society, she was suffering from a medical emergency that could have ended her short life.

At only ten months old,

she was a clear victim of neglect. Her leg was broken and had been for some time, open wounds covered her paws, and every breath shook her broken body as though it would be her last.

"She was likely involved in a car accident," says Surgical Services Supervisor, Samantha Delicati, "and it caused severe injuries to her abdomen, including a tear in her diaphragm."

Although our staff moved quickly to get Petunia the surgery needed to save her life, her chances of survival were low.

She responded poorly to her procedure and required overnight monitoring at a pet emergency clinic. Being left

untreated for so long, her abdomen was incredibly shrunken, and she continued to have difficulty eating and breathing. A second emergency surgery was done, but Petunia's health deteriorated to a point of uncertainty. SAHS staff was forced to consider humane euthanasia to end her suffering.

But Petunia is a fighter. After weeks of healing and rehabilitation, she no longer resembles the dying puppy who came through our doors in early January.

"She rolls over, asks for belly rubs..." says Natasha Hernandez, Animal Health Supervisor, "We're incredibly grateful that our team's hard work was not in vain. Petunia can finally be a happy puppy."

Though her intense medical care lasted for only thirty days, Petunia underwent multiple surgeries, emergency room visits, and daily monitoring — a cost to our Medical Rescue Fund that totaled in the thousands. Thankfully, due to the consistent support of compassionate donors like you, Petunia and other animals in need receive the treatment and second chance they deserve.

Helping Hedge-Hog Home

Stolen, returned, and adopted. It happened in under seventy-two hours. Hedge-Hog, the nine-monthold Alaskan Husky, had already suffered through abandonment when, on a busy Saturday in April, he was kidnapped by a couple posing as typical adopters.

The couple entered our front doors like any other visitor. They expressed their interest in meeting with Hedge-Hog, and after a chat with kennel staff and volunteers, they were allowed to socialize out in the courtyard. With leash in hand, they casually strolled out the lobby door. They did this without adoption papers, without an interview, and without our knowledge.

Our shelter surveillance footage captured clear shots of the couple, and the media was immediately alerted. Due to the quick action of staff, Hedge-Hog's kidnapping was shared far and wide on TV, radio, and online media. Thanks to this coverage, which reached millions, Hedge-Hog's kidnappers ultimately returned him to our front doors less than twenty-four hours later.

According to staff at the shelter that Sunday morning, a woman resembling one of his kidnappers walked up to the front doors with Hedge-Hog and claimed to have found him on the side of the road. Upon further questioning from staff, the woman immediately walked away and

got into a waiting vehicle.

Hedge-Hog was hungry and thirsty, but thrilled to see our staff, and thankfully unharmed. And twenty-four hours later, he was adopted.

Since Hedge-Hog's safe return, our staff



continues to remain vigilant. SAHS staff is limited and primarily focused on tending to each pet in our care, a number that can range from 100 to 150 pets daily. Security remains in the lobby for the safety of front desk staff, who work with the public coordinating animal surrenders, accepting adoption applications, and fielding numerous inquiries regarding services offered.

Like many nonprofit organizations, we could always use more resources and hands on deck. It's for this reason that we are grateful for the regular contributions made by you to help us continue operating smoothly. It was thanks to all of our supporters that Hedge-Hog was brought safely back into our care.


You Help Us Save Lives Every Day
