What's hard to imagine is how Wallaby and Wallaroo came into our care at the San Antonio Humane Society

(SAHS). They were only a few days old when found in a basket at a bus stop. Abandoned, without anyone to care for them, a good Samaritan brought them to the SAHS in desperate need of help. Our foster coordinator immediately put out a plea in hopes of finding a foster family able to care for them until they were ready for adoption. The unique aspect of our foster program is that we provide all of the necessities for our foster pets (e.g., bedding, formula, food/water bowls, crates, toys and medications), in order to make this transition for all as simple as possible. Wallaby and Wallaroo thrived while in their foster home for several weeks and were adopted into loving forever homes. We are

Learning to Walk Again

Unlike the usual cases of sick or injured pets taken in by the San Antonio Humane Society (SAHS), Jeep arrived with all the signs of a normal, healthy dog. He came into our care through our transfer partnership with Animal Care Services (ACS) and was immediately made available for adoption. For two weeks, Jeep ate normally, acted normally, and gave no hint that he would soon suffer from a sudden mystery affliction that would leave him paralyzed.

He could not stand, he could not walk unassisted, and eventually, as the paralysis in his hind legs moved into his forelegs, he was bedridden and unable to walk completely.


Our medical team was very concerned, "It appeared that something was wrong with his spine, and that can be very challenging and expensive to manage — especially for a nonprofit with limited funds available."

Due to our limited space, Jeep was moved out of the kennel and into our surgery office for what was sure to be a long and difficult rehabilitation. Because of the severity and obscurity of his affliction, he received around-the-clock care. In the evenings and during the weekend, he was transported to and cared for at the home of a staff member.

After he overcame the first few days of discomfort, it was clear Jeep's attitude was not hampered by his sudden limitations. "From the beginning," said Samantha Delicati, Surgery Services Supervisor, "his attitude was so positive. His tail wags nonstop. He showed us some really encouraging signs, and that made us want to fight for him and give him the chance to recover."

When Jeep's X-ray results returned, they were inconclusive and revealed no clear cause for his sudden paralysis. With no definite answers, the road to recovery seemed distant and at times nonexistent. As staff continued searching



for solutions, Jeep remained immobile and anchored to his bed.

Although his hopes were high, Jeep's limitations kept him frustrated. When left alone without staff for company, he would cry constantly for attention.

Determined to take advantage of every available resource, our surgery staff consulted outside veterinarians and landed on an unorthodox solution: acupuncture.

In addition to his routine physical therapy, Jeep began regular acupuncture treatment that lasted three weeks. Slowly, with much patience, hard work and plenty of tail wagging, Jeep began to show signs of movement in his legs.

Jeep spent months at the SAHS. Months receiving costly medical care and rehabilitation that ultimately saved his life. Alone, Jeep would not have stood a chance. Thanks to the funds provided by regular supporters like you, Jeep was able to walk again.
