

Too Young for Lifesaving Surgery



Due to San Antonio's generally mild weather, kitten season in our community rarely comes to an end. On average and depending on the availability of foster homes, the San Antonio Humane Society (SAHS)

foster program generally houses between 70 and 150 pets in foster care. Many of these pets are too young to be adopted or are on the verge of life-improving medical procedures. For four very young kittens, it was both.

Fred, Wilma, Betty, and Barney were barely 4 weeks old when they came to the SAHS in need of care. They were rescued by their foster parents after they were discovered on a very hot and dry August day alone and vulnerable to the elements.

During their evaluation, staff diagnosed the kittens with feline eyelid agenesis — a birth defect where the upper

eyelid is not formed. This defect means their eyes are open and exposed to irritants. This condition can cause pain, inflammation, limited vision, and sensitivity to light.

When this story went to print, these four young kittens were still too underweight and too young to be considered for surgery. Eventually, they will see a specialist to help correct their condition, and while they are healing, they will remain in the care of one of our dedicated foster parents.

Your continued support helps kittens like Fred, Wilma, Betty, and Barney who are still growing and healing with

Found Abandoned with a Three-Pound Tumor

Roughly 75% of the adoptable pets surrendered, transferred, or brought in as strays to the SAHS are not spayed/neutered. With hundreds of thousands of pets roaming the streets unaltered, thousands more puppies and kittens are born without a home every year.

In 2019, the SAHS conducted over 19,000 spay/neuter surgeries and we are projected to exceed that number after the completion of the Leeu Naylor Medical Building on our Fredericksburg Road campus. Not only does surgery reduce pet overpopulation, but it also prevents pets from being at an increased risk of certain cancers and infections that could greatly reduce their lifespan.

Gertrude, a senior Bulldog mix found abandoned and alone, is living proof of this reality.

She was transferred to the SAHS from the City of San Antonio Animal Care Services (ACS) with large tumors on her underbelly. These large growths were mammary tumors and they are common in female dogs who have not been spayed. When Gertrude was discovered by ACS, she was wandering the streets as a stray. There were many obvious physical traits that showed she'd had multiple litters in her lifetime.

Because she's a senior, and due to the size of the tumor, we had several concerns for Gertrude going into surgery. After two hours, the largest tumor was removed — a mass weighing in at over 3 lbs. Additionally, during her routine spay surgery, Gertrude's ovaries were discovered to be cystic and cancerous. After some initial recovery, a second mammary tumor was discovered weighing over 1 lb. and was removed successfully.

You're helping us give pets like Gertrude the opportunity to live out her golden years in a loving home.

As this story was going to print, Gertrude was still recovering from her second surgery in the comfort of



our surgery office. She receives daily walks and attention from staff and volunteers going about their business. Our staff believes, with a dedicated adopter in a loving home, Gertrude's outlook looks golden.

When the SAHS spays/neuters the thousands of pets that come into our care, we're preventing tragic experiences like Gertrude's and countless unwanted litters in our community that would otherwise have no place to call home.

Your donor dollars are lengthening the lives of pets who might otherwise suffer from painful infections or malignant cancers. When you help us spay/neuter pets in our community, you're helping us give pets like Gertrude the opportunity to live out her golden years in a loving home.
