Young Pup With Cable Wire Embedded In Neck Safe At The SAHS



SA, TX (October 12, 2017) Yesterday a young Retriever mix named Stanford was brought to the San Antonio Humane Society by a Good Samaritan. He was covered in fleas and suffered from obvious neglect. Upon further examination, our medical team concluded that immediate assistance was needed.

After anesthesia was given, wire cutters were used to remove an embedded cable wire, at least a ½ inch deep, from Stanford's neck. During this process, his neck was shaved, hydrotherapy was provided, and his wound was treated with medical honey.

This was likely a result of tethering the pup from leaving his residence and unfortunately, due to the extent of damage, he suffered through months of pain from tissue damage and infection.
