5,000 San Antonio Humane Society Pets Adopted thus far in 2017

SA, TX (December 20, 2017) The San Antonio Humane Society (SAHS) celebrated its 5,000th adoption Tuesday, December 19, with eleven days left until the end of the year.

The lucky pet is a 1-year-old gray tabby named Laverne and the even luckier family, the Irwin family, is excited to welcome the new addition into their home before the holiday weekend.

"Without the support of a proactive and giving community, this accomplishment would not have been possible," says Nancy F. May, SAHS President/CEO, "As we continue to improve the lives of dogs and cats in our community, finding loving forever homes for the pets in our care is always an important goal of ours."

Although the Irwin family had always intended to add a cat to their family, they had yet to find the perfect
