Low-Cost Veterinary Services Begin this Month at Brooks Spay/Neuter Clinic



SA, TX (March 21, 2017) As of this morning, the doors are officially open for Southside city residents in search of low-cost spay/neuter and Wellness Clinic services. Brooks Spay/Neuter Clinic, operated by the San Antonio Humane Society (SAHS), is San Antonio's newest resource to help fight the city's pet overpopulation problem and continue the SAHS's mission to improve the lives and health of dogs and cats in the community.

The Brooks Spay/Neuter Clinic, owned by the City of San Antonio was recently built in partnership by the municipality and Brooks City Base. Under the SAHS's operation, 5,000 spay/neuter surgeries are expected to be conducted at the Brooks Spay/Neuter Clinic in its first year and that number is expected to increase to 8,000 surgeries by its third year of operation. In 2016 the SAHS conducted 8,512 spay/neuter surgeries and treated 1,280 dogs and cats during public Wellness Clinics.

"We are thrilled to have the opportunity to operate the Brooks Spay/Neuter Clinic," says Nancy F. May, President/CEO of the SAHS. "By providing low-cost spay/neuter and Wellness Clinic services, as well as community education, we will impact a great number of pets not only in District 3, but in San Antonio overall."

The Brooks Spay/Neuter Clinic is located off Southeast Military at 8034 City Base Landing, 78235 and operation hours are Tuesday through Saturday, 7:30 AM – 5:00 PM.
