Dear Friends,

We believe, like you do, that each animal is precious – and deserves to live a wonderful life that includes a forever-loving home. Because we are a "No Kill" shelter, the San Antonio Humane Society ensures every adoptable and treatable dog and cat in our care is saved. In 2009, we rescued 5,000 animals – 95% were saved – distinguishing us as having one of the highest percentages in the nation (statistics are displayed on our website, www.sahumane.org, under "About Us," click the "Community Statistics" link). These animals arrived not only from good Samaritans, but also adoption transfers from 33 agencies – some of which are forced to euthanize to make space. We work hard to make a difference – these impressive statistics show we are succeeding. Another 2009 focus is our education and spay/neuter programs, which along with our adoptions help San Antonio conquer serious problems like irresponsible pet ownership and overpopulation. What's more, our education program now offers year-round services, made possible by a recent and generous gift from the Coates Foundation. We encourage you to explore these new and exciting programs on our website this fall.

Additionally, because of your support, our goal to perform inhouse and public spay/neuter surgeries is now a reality. We offer the unique service of public appointments on weekends, making our state-of-the-art surgical suite busy seven days a week! We are grateful for funding provided by the City of San Antonio and an anonymous San Antonio Area Foundation donor that provides low-income families spay and neuter services for their pets. Our surgery suite is just a part of our vision – and serves as a stop-gap measure, but necessary to intermediate part of our grand vision – a shelter medicine hospital. With your continued support, we have no doubt we will reach our goal. We are grateful to all of our Humane Society supporters, and I hope this annual report reminds you that your gifts of time and dollars really do make a difference. With your help, we continue to pave the way in creating ground-breaking services that ensure a healthy, happy and bright future for our San Antonio animals!

The San Antonio Humane Society receives dogs and cats hit by cars, are starving and dehydrated, suffering from painful skin conditions or injuries due to cruelty or lack of care. Thankfully, our medical rescue fund allows us to provide the highest-quality medical care to these forgotten and neglected animals. With the help of our donors, we take grievous wrongs and do our best to make it right.





Surgical Suite SPAY/NEUTER CLIMIC - THE IMPORTANCE OF STERILIZATION



Millions of companion animals are euthanized each year in the United States because there are simply not enough loving homes to accommodate them. Spaying and neutering pets helps ensure every dog and cat has a forever-loving home.

We are proud to announce our spay/neuter clinic is open, offering spay/neuter services to the public by appointment on Wednesday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Pets must be at least eight weeks old and weigh at least two pounds. Low-income families earning less than \$21,000 per year qualify for subsidized surgeries.

These spay/neuter services are an important stepping-stone in reaching San Antonio's goal of creating a "No Kill" community.

"No Kill" means saving every adoptable and treatable orphan in our care.

We dream of a day when puppies and kittens are precious gifts due to their rarity, not throw away commodities...

The San Antonio Humane Society is our city's number one adoption agency. Approximately 95% of animals surrendered or transferred into our care are adopted. Only the untreatable, contagious without foster, or dangerous are euthanized.

Here are a number of things we provide for our adopters:

- An open visiting area to spend time with our pets
- An Adoption Counselor available to match every person with the right pet and meet the needs of both
 - Same day adoption process
 - Application available online at www.sahumane.org

Every adopted animal & family will receive:

- Their first vaccine, spay or neuter surgery by a licensed vet, canine heartworm testing (if over seven months), feline leukemia and FIV testing, a de-wormer treatment for hookworms, roundworms, and whipworms, a collar, ID tag, microchip and microchip registration, two weeks of VCA vet coverage, and one month of free Shelter care insurance
 - Information about training, the annual cost of pet ownership, local rules and regulations





SPAY NEUTER CLINIC

In August 2009, the San Antonio Humane John C. & Dorothy R. Wilson Spay Neuter Suite celebrated its grand opening by helping the community increase spay/neuter capacity. First, I would like to thank each of you for your continued support – everyday, you make a positive difference in a dog or cat's life – that's something you should be incredibly proud of. Because of you, we experienced a stellar 2009 that resulted in a myriad of exciting developments, including expanded services, outreach programs and educational efforts. For example, I am happy to report because of our involvement in area and statewide disaster relief initiatives, we have saved thousands of dogs and cats from untimely deaths, providing them with foreverloving homes and families. We have also increased our educational initiatives, offering summer youth camps that teach empathy and respect for animals through hands-on experience. We are also incredibly proud of our new, state-of-the-art, high-volume spay/neuter surgical suite. Thanks to generous donations from our supporters, we are now able to perform more than 40 surgeries per day. With more than 10,000 homeless pets wandering the city streets every month, our spay/neuter surgical suite provides the resources necessary to ensure that one day in the near future, our community's pet overpopulation challenge will end. I, like you, imagine a community where every dog and cat is treated with respect and compassion – that every dog and cat has a permanent, loving home. With one of the largest pet populations in the country, if we as a community do not make a sizable difference in addressing pet overpopulation in the near future, the numbers of unwanted pets will grow exponentially as we grow – a frightening thought. And although we have reached – or exceeded – many of our goals in 2009, our vision is far from complete.

MY VISION FOR OUR HUMANE SOCIETY INCLUDES THE FOLLOWING THREE GOALS:

- 1. Doubling our capacity to rescue and adopt more orphaned pets in our community from approximately 5,000 to 10,000 pets annually.
- 2. Expanding our Humane Education Department outreach programs, offering more classes that focus on teaching the humane treatment of animals to young people and adults.
- 3. Increasing low-income spays and neuters by at least 1,000 more animals annually.

Whether you support one, two or all of the above goals, each one is extremely important in ensuring a brighter future for our orphaned animals. So, on behalf of everyone at the San Antonio Humane Society, thank you – whether through donations, through volunteering or through adoption – we couldn't do what we do without you.
