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

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LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT/CEO NANCY F. MAY



Dear Friends,

I hope you are all having as great of a year as we are at the San Antonio Humane Society. As 2014 comes to an end, I am pleased to reflect below on some wonderful accomplishments we experienced at the SAHS in the recent months.

For the very first time in San Antonio, the SAHS and hundreds of non-profits participated in The Big Give S.A., a 24-hour day of giving. We would like to thank those who supported the SAHS on this historic day by donating a total of 332 gifts, resulting in \$14,270 raised for our pets. How amazing is that?!

Also, thanks to funding provided by PetSmart Charities®, we were able to spay/neuter 300 public pets for only \$20 each this past June and August through *Precious Not Parents* and *Primp Your Pit*. It is vital for us to offer these services to the San Antonio community in order to decrease the city's pet overpopulation problem.

One way of educating and informing our community of such issues is through Humane Education. This summer welcomed 5 sessions of Camp Humane at the SAHS, where we educated 188 individuals ranging from 5 to 16 years of age. Our Humane Educator and 13 presenters shared age appropriate information regarding pet responsibility, spay/neuter efforts and various wildlife matters. These camps are fundamental, as they are designed to foster a special appreciation for animals.

We also kicked off our annual giving campaign with our "Diamonds in the Ruff" luncheon, which brought in nearly \$150,000. This is essential to the San Antonio Humane Society because as we continue to grow and accept more pets into our care, our financial needs increase as well. The average cost per pet awaiting adoption at the SAHS is \$545; this includes adoption preparation and general pet care. Please consider us in your year-end giving, as your pledges and gifts will help us reach our goals for 2014. Your generosity towards our mission to shelter and care for thousands of pets each year is greatly appreciated!

A big thank you to our Board of Directors, donors, staff, volunteers, foster families, and others for continuing to support the San Antonio Humane Society!

CATCHING UP WITH DR. COURTNEY H. BRIDGEMAN



Obesity is as much a problem for the pets across America as it is for Americans themselves. According to the Association for Pet Obesity Prevention more than half of all dogs and cats in the United States are overweight with numbers approaching 20% considered truly obese. Obesity is defined as the buildup of adipose (fat) tissue within the body including interior body cavities. Most veterinarians measure your pet on a body condition score that uses either 5 or 9 points. On the 9 point system, 5 is considered ideal, 6-8 overweight, and 8+ obese.

Q: What's the appropriate amount to feed my pet?

A: First, it's important to know that the biggest single factor for obesity is high calorie intake. Many owners unrealistically believe that their pet can self-feed (called free-feeding) reasonably. In general, this is simply not true. Most pets have as hard a time free-feeding as people do. Even pets who successfully "free-feed" are often a body condition score of 6 or 7 rather than the ideal 5. The reason for this is simple. As carnivores in the wild, canines and felines never know when their next meal will be caught. Therefore, their instincts tell them to eat as much as possible of what they do succeed in catching and gorge themselves. Even though our pets have existed with us for centuries, this instinct is still present within them. Abundance is just not part of their make-up.

An average sized dog should be eating between 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ -2 cups of food per day. An average sized cat should be eating around $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of food per day. Even so, all pets are unique and you should always get your vet's opinion on what amount of food is good for your pet and stick to it!

Q: Is it ok to feed my pet scraps and treats?

A: No. Not only is this a dramatic increase in calorie intake but also a good way to cause stomach upset, diarrhea, or even a potentially fatal gastroenteritis (called Garbage Gut in the ER circle). There are plenty of people who pride themselves on the fact that they don't give table scraps of any kind, feed a well-rationed meal and yet their pet is still overweight. Why? Treats may be to blame!

Suggestion: If you have a routine of training and treating your dog and weight is a concern, use your dog's food as its treat! Instead of putting the food in a bowl, carry the food around with you in a baggie. Anytime you would give the dog a treat, give them a piece of their food instead!

Q: How much exercise does my pet need?

A: Finding exercise that a cat will do can be a real herculean challenge! Cats are cats and once they decide they aren't "in the mood", it's almost impossible to convince them otherwise. Laser pointers, feather flicks, and other such active toys are great ways to teach young cats how to exercise and keep them fit longer. An animal who spends all its time behind the same four walls (whether those walls are a home or a fence) is NOT successfully exercising its mind nor, in most cases, its body. Get your dog, regardless of size, out of its four walls and into the world for at LEAST 30 minutes a day. An hour would be better. Consider it a GREAT excuse to get your exercise as well!

Volunteer Spotlight: Bill Merrill



Bill Merrill became a volunteer at the San Antonio Humane Society in early 2012. He is semi-retired and wanted to do something useful with his available time, so he decided to volunteer. Since he loves dogs, the SAHS was a natural fit. While Bill usually assists in cleaning the adult dog kennels, he has also helped our staff by walking hundreds of dogs and bathing several dozen. Bill has made an amazing impression on the SAHS, which is why we approached him about assisting with our Volunteer For A Day program. He takes on this role with integrity and a ton of passion towards the SAHS pets.

When asked what he finds rewarding about volunteering, Bill replied,

The staff and rescued animals are wonderful, and it's a great feeling knowing I'm part of a very worthwhile cause that's giving a forever home to these fabulous four-legged companions! It's also great meeting and working with other volunteers. When people find out that I volunteer at the SAHS, they often tell me they could never do it, that it would be too hard seeing all the animals--'I'd want to adopt every one of them!' Well, I did end up adopting one amazing pooch, Cory, but I could easily have adopted several more that I really came to love as I got to know them. It's enough for me to know that the dogs and cats are so much better off at the shelter than they were before (usually as strays or surrendered by owners), and I know the SAHS does such a fantastic job matching thousands of dogs and cats with the right humans for them.

With more than 1,000 hours logged, Bill has impacted so many human and dog lives since becoming a volunteer and we are forever grateful for his support.

SUCCESS STORY: CORY

"Cory is an 8 year old German Shepherd mix. He adopted me when he was 6 years old, after we got to know each other at the San Antonio Humane Society over a few weeks while I was volunteering. I took him for several walks, and each time he was very friendly and let me know in every way but words that he would love to go home with me! Since then we have had two super-swell years together, and he has become good pals with my other dog, Waffles the Yellow Lab (also a rescue dog). He is so nice, and also a very handsome fellow, with the softest fur coat.

From Cory, I have learned a bunch of things, and here are two of them. First, it helps to visit with a dog more than once before you make the decision to adopt. While Cory was friendly right from the very beginning, as I got to know him better, I knew that adopting him was going to work out great! Second, adopting an older dog is a really good thing. Cory was already housebroken, socialized, and remains active while still being pretty laid-back. He likes to play with humans and with Waffles, but he's also content to just hang out. A relaxed older dog like Cory would be an excellent match for a single person who works all day and doesn't want to worry about what the dog is up to while they're away."

Training Tip:

When joining a group class, you should look for how many dogs are in the class. Large classes of 9 or more dogs make it very hard for you to get individualized help. Checking the class curriculum is vital to ensure your issues will be addressed. Be sure the class covers the commands you are looking for; always get at least 2 vet references for a dog trainer.

At the San Antonio Humane Society, our goal is to find loving homes for all of our adoptable pets. Not knowing exactly what their backgrounds entail, it is imperative for us to learn about their personalities and temperaments, in order to place them in the best home possible. When it comes to our adult dogs, this is where Kevin "Big Dawg" Glowski, will continue making an impact at the SAHS. He has not only committed several years to dog training but he has also spent many hours as a SAHS volunteer. Kevin is now taking on the role as our new Animal Behavior Program Supervisor and has recently stated, "Training is important for several reasons and should not be taken lightly. By training your dog you establish communication and respect between dog and owner. Training helps to mentally stimulate them; combined with daily exercise, your dog will be well-adjusted and a much happier dog!"

To help our staff improve their skills on assisting our adoptable dogs, Kevin is showing them handling and obedience techniques. He is also working with our volunteers by creating an enrichment team that helps them teach our pups better manners by using positive reward methods. Kevin is pleased to share, "To date we have worked with several dogs; helping a few get adopted much quicker by teaching them polite leash walking and basic commands that help with [impulsive] issues." We are looking forward to what's to come!

Duke of the Ever-Present Fire Hydrant DUNCAN HAVELKA

We are saddened to share that Duncan, our reigning Duke of the Ever-Present Fire Hydrant, passed away in September. - Regular adoption fees range from \$30 to \$99.
- All pets adopted from the San Antonio Humane
 Society have been spayed or neutered and received
 their first set of vaccinations, de-wormer, and flea
 prevention. Cats are tested for FIV/FELV and dogs
 receive heartworm prevention. Both dogs and cats
 come with a microchip, 14 days free vet care for
 VCA hospitals, 30 days of free pet insurance*, a
 bag of Hill's Science Diet food, and a collar with a
 personalized tag. (*some restrictions apply)

VOLUNTEER

- A volunteer orientation and follow up meeting are mandatory for each individual prior to volunteering.
- An orientation fee is required (per person) which covers a volunteer T-shirt or apron, badge, and insurance coverage while volunteering.
- Individuals 12-15 years of age are referred to as
 Junior Volunteers and must have a parent/adult (18
 years of age or older) volunteer with them at all times
 and those 16 years of age and older can volunteer on
 their own
- Volunteer hours are 8am-7pm, every day except major holidays.
