## Siberian Husky Survives Multiple Bullet Wounds, Now Available for Adoption



**San Antonio, TX - Sept. 6, 2024** - Mister, a resilient three-year-old Siberian Husky, arrived at the San Antonio Humane Society (SAHS) in early August with a shocking past. Upon intake, SAHS medical staff discovered that Mister's left hind foot had suffered severe trauma, with his toes completely broken and dislocated. X-rays also revealed a bullet lodged in the same leg, suggesting the brave dog may have survived multiple bullet wounds before arriving at the shelter.

The SAHS immediately implemented a treatment plan to relieve pain and repair his foot, including laser therapy and medical honey bandages. Due to the sensitivity of the wound, Mister had to be sedated for each bandage change. Despite the pain he was in, he continued to be a happy and easy-going patient through a whole month of dedicated wound care, and Mister has made a beautiful recovery! According to SAHS Associate Veterinarian Dr. Leslie Hopes, "Now that his foot has healed, he will be able to run and play without pain and be able to live his best life."

We know that Mister will make a great companion to his forever family thanks to the efforts of SAHS staff and volunteers. This remarkable story of survival highlights the importance of the SAHS' mission to provide medical care and a second chance to animals in need.
